Williams Township is pleased to announce that we accept passport applications on behalf of the U.S. Department of State.

Customers will now have the option to apply for a passport book, a passport card or both. The passport card may only be used for land and sea travel between the U.S. and Canada, Mexico, Bermuda and the Caribbean. The passport card will provide a less expensive, smaller and more convenient alternative for those who travel to these destinations.

U.S. citizens may apply for their passports during regular business hours at the township office, Monday thru Friday. The standard passport fee is \$100.00 for adults and \$85.00 for children, 15 years and younger. The passport card is \$45.00 for adults and \$35.00 for children, 15 years and younger.

## **Intergovernmental Advisory Committee Now Being Formed**

A special meeting of the Williams Township Board of Trustees and the Auburn City Commission was held on April 24, 2008. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss and identify areas of possible further cooperation between township and city.

It was decided to form an Intergovernmental Advisory Committee (IAC). The IAC will be comprised of the Mayor of Auburn and the Williams Township Supervisor, along with one other elected member of both the township board and city commission. In addition, two residents at-large from each municipality will be chosen to complete an eight member committee.

The IAC is charged with studying areas of possible further cooperation between both governmental entities. Committee meetings will be posted in accordance with the Open Meetings Act and the public will be encouraged to attend.

**Volunteers Needed:** If you are interested in serving as a resident at-large on the IAC, please complete and submit an Application for Township Boards and Commissions to the Township Supervisor's Office. The application is available at the Township Office or on the township website in the Boards and Commissions section.

## **Election News**

Michigan voters will go to the polls on August 5<sup>th</sup> to select nominees for the November 4<sup>th</sup> General Election ballot. There will be a long list of state and local offices on the August ballot and, as always, sample ballots will be available at the clerk's office. If you cannot stop by the office, call and one will be mailed to you.

A permanent absent voter list is maintained by the township clerk for persons wanting to receive an application for an absent voter ballot prior to each election. Applications are automatically mailed approximately 4 to 6 weeks prior to all elections. This is a convenient solution for persons over 60 years of age, for persons physically unable to attend the polls without assistance or for those away from the community who want to vote but cannot get to the polls on Election Day. ### **Photo Identification Required**

Due to a recent Michigan Supreme Court ruling regarding a Michigan law passed in 1996, all voters are now required to show photo identification when voting at the polls.

Voters must comply with the requirement by showing photo identification or by signing an affidavit attesting that he or she is not in possession of picture identification.

Accepted forms of photo identification are:

- Drivers License or personal identification card
- Federal or State government-issued photo identification
- United States Passport
- Military ID with photo
- Student identification with photo from a high school or accredited institution of higher learning
- Tribal identification card with photo

The photo identification requirement does not apply to persons voting by absentee ballot.

Voters who do not have a photo ID and want one can get a state identification card at any Secretary of State Branch office for \$10. State ID cards are free to individuals who are 65 or older, blind, or who have had their driving privileges terminated due to a physical or mental condition. Proof of identity and residency are required when applying for a State ID card.

## 2008 Summer Property Taxes

It's that time of year again (already!)

You should receive your summer 2008 Property Tax bill by July 1<sup>st</sup>. If you do not receive your tax bill by July 1<sup>st</sup>, or shortly thereafter, let our office know as soon as possible so we can send you a copy of your bill. Be sure to review your tax bill as soon as you receive it to verify that all information is correct (i.e. address, principal residence exemption status, etc.). If there are any errors, please contact our office immediately so the necessary corrections can be made. Any errors will be corrected at the Board of Review meeting held on July 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Summer property taxes may be paid or deferred between July 1<sup>st</sup> and September 15<sup>th</sup> without penalty. Beginning September 16<sup>th</sup> a 1% late penalty will be added to all unpaid summer tax bills. An additional 1% will be added each month through February 14<sup>th</sup>. An additional 3% penalty will be added on February 15<sup>th</sup>.

You may pay your property taxes in person at the treasurer's office, by mail, or by placing your payment in our drop box located in the front of our office building. ***If using our drop box, please do not pay with cash, checks only!*** If you require a "Stamped Paid Receipt", please include a self-addressed stamped envelope.

If you qualify and plan to defer your summer property taxes, stop by the treasurer's office as soon as possible to sign a deferment form. A new deferment form must be executed each year. Our summer office hours are Monday through Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Friday 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. We will be closed July 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>, August 29<sup>th</sup> and September 1<sup>st</sup>.

## July Board Of Review

***The July Board of Review will meet at 4:00 p.m. on July 22, 2008 at the Williams Township Offices to correct qualified errors in the roll. These include:***

- A mutual mistake of fact.
- A clerical error relative to the correct assessment figures, the rate of taxation, or the mathematical computation relating to the assessing of taxes.
- An error regarding the correct taxable status of the real property being assessed.
- Disputes over claims for the homeowner's principal residence, poverty, and initial qualified agricultural property exemptions.

## Note From The Assessor

A new property tax bill has been signed into law. House Bill 4215, creating Public Act 96 will allow property owners to have two principal residence exemptions in certain situations.

In order to qualify for the second exemption, the home in question must have been the principal residence prior to the owners moving out. The vacated home must remain unoccupied and may not be rented out to receive the exemption. The property must be offered for sale or for rent.

The extra exemption may be renewed for an additional two years, but requires the property owner to notify the assessor by Dec. 31<sup>st</sup> of each year in order to receive the tax break.

## ***From The Supervisor***

### Brush Chipping and Disposal

Williams Township continues to offer a residential brush chipping service. This service is for township residents that have trimmed their own trees themselves as an alternative to open burning. Commercial tree cutting services and "For-Hire" tree cutters must dispose of the trees and brush they cut and trim.

Brush must be placed at the road shoulder with all ends facing towards the road. Pieces must be small enough and piled appropriately for one person to handle. Due to ever increasing fuel costs, please call the Township Office to be placed on the "Chipping List" when the brush is ready to chip so we can route the crew in the most efficient manner. Chipping requests should be limited to one request per month per household.

Whenever you have a couple of branches or a small amount of brush, please put it out for Waste Management to pick up as yard waste on your normal trash pickup day. Brush for Waste Management pickup needs to be placed in paper yard waste bags, containers marked "Yard Waste," or tied together in bundles up to 24 inches in diameter, up to 48 inches in length, and weighing no more than 50 pounds per bundle, with individual pieces not exceeding 2 inches in diameter.

### Yard Waste in Ditches

Please do not place grass clippings, yard waste, leaves, or debris in the ditches. This contributes to poor drainage for you, your neighbors, and the entire township. Waste Management picks up yard waste

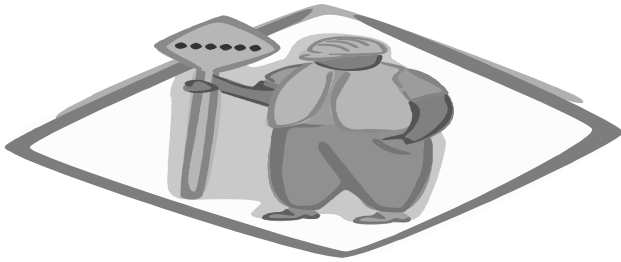
weekly on your normal trash collection day from April 1<sup>st</sup> through the end of November. Thank you for your help and understanding.

### **Fire Hydrants**

Township personnel will be conducting maintenance on fire hydrants in Williams Township this summer and fall. They will check for proper operation, flush and drain the hydrants. If you have a fire hydrant near your property, please help yourself and your neighbors by keeping hydrants clear of grass and weeds. **Your help is greatly appreciated.**

### **Unauthorized Use Of Fire Hydrants**

Unauthorized use of a fire hydrant to obtain free water should be reported immediately to 9-1-1. Besides not paying for the water, these unauthorized users typically do not pump out the water that remains in the barrel of the hydrant, which can then freeze in cold temperatures and render the hydrant inoperable when needed in an emergency. Thank you for your help!



### **Road Improvement Projects**

Two miles of local township roadway, Wilder Road, between 8 Mile and Garfield, is currently receiving major work. This section of roadway was crushed and shaped with additional gravel applied last fall. A double layer of Chip Seal will be applied in mid June or July 2008. A third layer of Chip Seal will be applied to 4 miles of Wilder Road, from 8 Mile to Carter, in 2009. A third layer of Chip Seal will be applied Kiesel Road, from Flajole to Rockwell, in 2008.

A mile of Flajole Road, from Wheeler to Wilder, is scheduled to be crushed and shaped with additional gravel applied this fall. A double layer of Chip Seal will be applied in 2009, with a third layer of Chip Seal planned for 2010.

Your patience and understanding is greatly appreciated during all road improvement projects.

### **Waste Management**

It is strongly encouraged that all trash be placed in bags, whether in or out of trash cans (including "Green Monsters"). This will help assure that the trash ends up in the landfill where it belongs, and not blowing around the Township, especially on windy collection days.

Items banned from Michigan landfills include whole tires, beverage containers, yard waste, lead acid batteries, used oil, low-level radioactive waste, regulated hazardous waste, liquid waste, sewage, PCBs and asbestos waste.

Waste Management will pick up beverage containers for recycling in Williams Township on your regularly scheduled pickup day for recyclable items. Whole tires can be disposed of through tire dealers, or through the Bay County Mosquito Control Scrap Tire Collection Program on June 6 – 7, 2008. Contact Mosquito Control at 894-4555 for details.

An optional service that is available from Waste Management for a nominal fee is the availability of 96-gallon, "Green Monster" receptacles. These are the 96-gallon, large green receptacles on wheels with covers that are seen in several neighboring communities. Williams Township residents can lease a "Green Monster" directly from Waste Management. The current cost is \$1.50 per month billed annually, and includes any maintenance required to the receptacle, like wheels or covers. Please call Waste Management Customer Service at 1-800-796-9696 if you are interested in leasing a "Green Monster."

### **Hazardous Materials**

For proper disposal of all hazardous materials, contact the Bay County Health Department at 895-4006.

### **Ordinance Violations**

If you would like to report a violation of any of the Township Ordinances, you may do so by filing a written complaint with the township. Complaint forms are available in the Township Office. The Zoning Administrator will investigate the complaint and take an appropriate course of action.

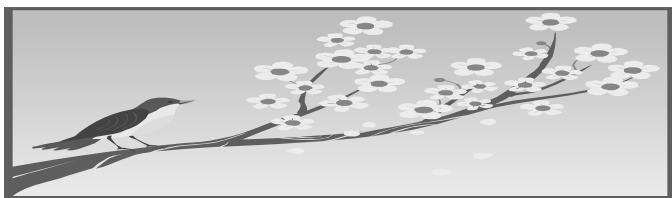

## **Dog and Cat Licenses**

If your dog or cat is licensed with Bay County, the County will send you the form for your new license in the mail a month before your old license expires, which is also when your animal needs their rabies vaccination.

Licenses may be purchased at most veterinary's offices, at any Township Office, Animal Control and the Bay County Treasurer's Office.

Please bring the form the County sent and proof of the rabies vaccination. Licenses for a new animal may be purchased by providing proof of rabies vaccination and if your animal was spayed or neutered, proof will also be required.



## **Pine Grove Cemetery**

Pine Grove Cemetery is located on the northwest corner of Eleven Mile and North Union Roads. It is Township owned and beautifully maintained by Don Dzurka, our Township Sexton.

The cemetery was recognized as a historic site on October 12, 1990 and is listed in the Michigan State Register of Historic Sites by the Michigan Historical Commission.

Burial fees are \$150.00 per space for Williams Township and City of Auburn residents and \$250.00 per space for non-residents. Opening and closings fees are \$375.00 and Cremation fees are \$125.00.

## **Revenue Sharing and You**

It's possible that you have heard the term "revenue sharing" in the news, by our state representative or senator and even by township officials. Like many, it may come across as one of those "government" words that you don't completely understand and you wonder what all the fuss is about.

Did you know that revenue sharing helps pay for essential services that keep you safe? Or that revenue sharing helps us maintain the local roads within the township? It does these things and much more. Revenue sharing has a direct impact on you as a resident of Williams Charter Township.

### **What exactly is revenue sharing?**

Revenue sharing is money that local governments, such as townships, cities, villages and counties, receive from the state.

Revenue sharing was established in 1946 by a vote of the people through a constitutional amendment to replace and relieve local taxation. The state promised to give local governments a portion of the money it received from other state taxes, including the sales and income taxes, and the Single Business Tax. The primary purpose of revenue sharing, when first implemented, was to limit local taxing authority while increasing state taxing authority, with the idea that a predetermined amount would be shared with the local government. Revenue sharing provides a basic level of funding for services to all cities, villages and townships, and to a few counties.

Revenue sharing was designed to be flexible, non-restricted funding that a community could use to best fit its needs. Local communities rely on revenue sharing to pay for services that directly impact your life. It is used to help fund police and fire protection as well as local roads, water, sewer services and a variety of other essential local services.

There are two types of revenue sharing in Michigan: statutory revenue sharing and constitutional revenue sharing. In 1996, the state stopped distributing revenue sharing from the income tax, Single Business Tax and intangibles tax, instead dedicating a percentage of the first 4 percent of the sales tax to revenue sharing. Constitutional revenue sharing is funded by taking 15 percent of the first 4 percent gross collection of the state sales tax. Statutory revenue sharing is funded by using 21.3 percent of the 4 percent gross collections of the state sales tax. The remaining 63.7 percent of revenue from the 4 percent gross collections is used to fund other state obligations. The remaining 2 percent of sales tax collected is dedicated to the school aid fund.

Due to the method used by the state Legislature to cut revenue sharing in order to balance the state budget, of the 1,242 townships across the state, less than 300 townships receive any amount of statutory revenue sharing. More than 945 townships, including Williams Township, receive only constitutional revenue sharing. Williams Township is not projected to receive any statutory revenue sharing in 2008.

### **So how does this affect life here in our township?**

Revenue sharing funding, although promised by the state, is also at the mercy of the state's economy and how much revenue the state takes in each year. In recent years, funding for revenue sharing has seen dramatic cuts as the state's economy has lagged. And as we look to future years, with skyrocketing gas prices and people cutting back on extras, revenue from sales tax could decrease, further impacting our revenue sharing funding and local services.

As lawmakers in Lansing battle over the 2008-09 fiscal year budget, which begins on Oct. 1, 2008, revenue sharing is once again a high profile topic. Now more than ever, money that local communities rely on to pay for essential services that directly impact your lives is continually being threatened. It is important that the township, on behalf of their residents, receives the appropriate level of funding to assist with local services.

Here at Williams Charter Township, we are doing all we can to make sure our state representative and senator are aware of how revenue sharing impacts our community. Just like you are counting on us to make this community a wonderful place to live, we are counting on Lansing lawmakers to make sure we receive proper funding from the state.

## What is Relay For Life?
